Arlo Davy Guthrie, born in 1947, son of beloved singer/writer/philosopher Woody Guthrie, often sings songs of protest against social injustice. Discography includes "Alice's Restaurant", too long for radio airplay; "Coming into Los Angeles", banned from many radio stations (but a favorite at the 1969 Woodstock Festival); and the definitive rendition of Steve Goodman's "City of New Orleans". An artist of international stature, Guthrie has toured throughout North America, Europe, Asia, Africa and Australia winning a wide, popular following. Guthrie launched his own record label Rising Son Records in 1983.

Alice's Restaurant, a talking blues song that lasts 18 minutes, sparked Arlo Guthrie's career in 1967. The title song premiered at the Newport Folk Festival and helped foster a new commitment among the '60s generation to social consciousness and activism. Arlo went on to star in the 1969 Hollywood film version of "Alice's Restaurant", directed by Arthur Penn.
